What does your church mean to you?

By learning more about God, and through communication with each other, we seek to know what it is to follow Jesus Christ – and to act upon that knowledge.

Emmanuel Episcopal Church is an important part of the South Jefferson community. Church members recently led a community fundraiser for a family facing high medical costs due to the illness of a beloved daughter. Last spring we hosted the Crop Hunger Walk. Each year the church celebrates St. Patrick's Day with a Shamrock Supper. We offer community dinners, Christmas gifts for needy children and a place for Alcoholics Anonymous to meet. We seek to better know and serve the larger community. We have a lot to learn and a lot still to do.

Emmanuel's mission is to "Love God and Serve People, to Serve God and Love People." It is trying to do that. It is open and receptive to do more.

A recent message in the devotional "Our Daily Bread" points out that "God provides for His people through His people." For Emmanuel Episcopal Church to carry out its mission and thrive as a faith community, members need to contribute what they can – their time, talent and treasure.

I hope you will consider what Emmanuel Episcopal Church means to you. If it is important for the parish to continue its spiritual and community roles, then members will need to support it as God leads them.
